Linking verbs are used to connect the subject of a sentence with a noun, pronoun, or adjective.

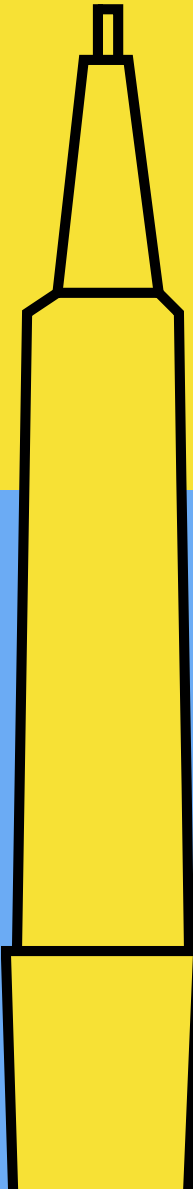

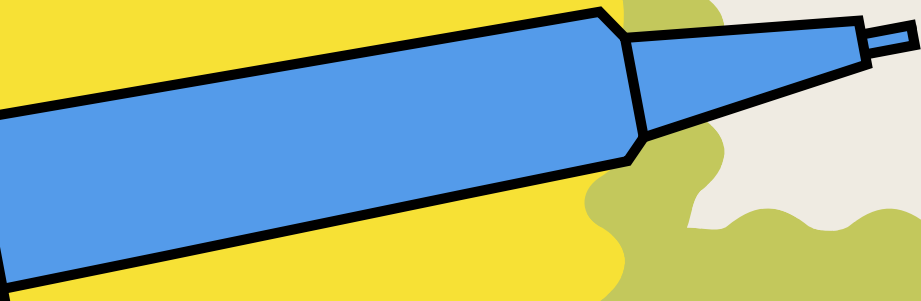
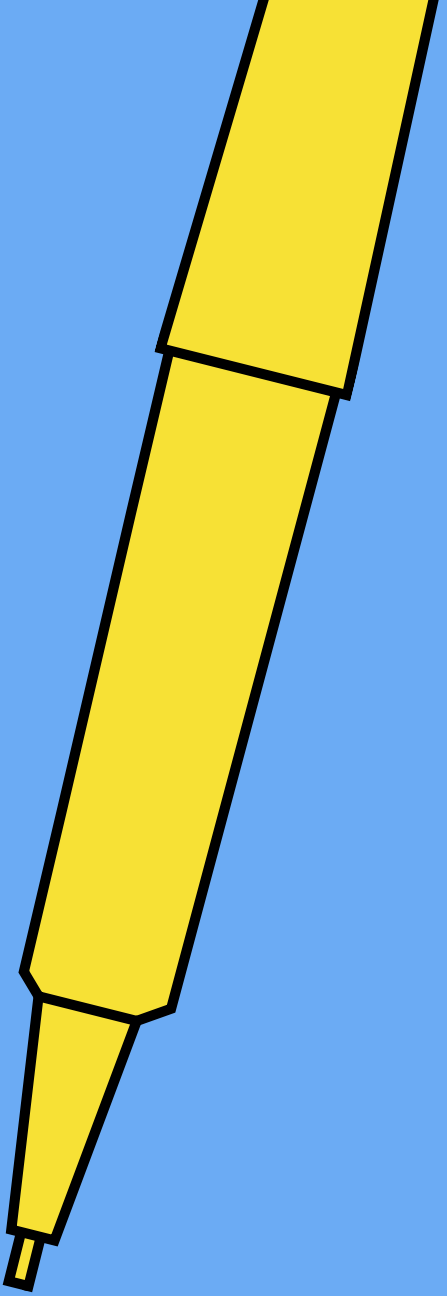
Linking verbs can show states
of being and conditions.

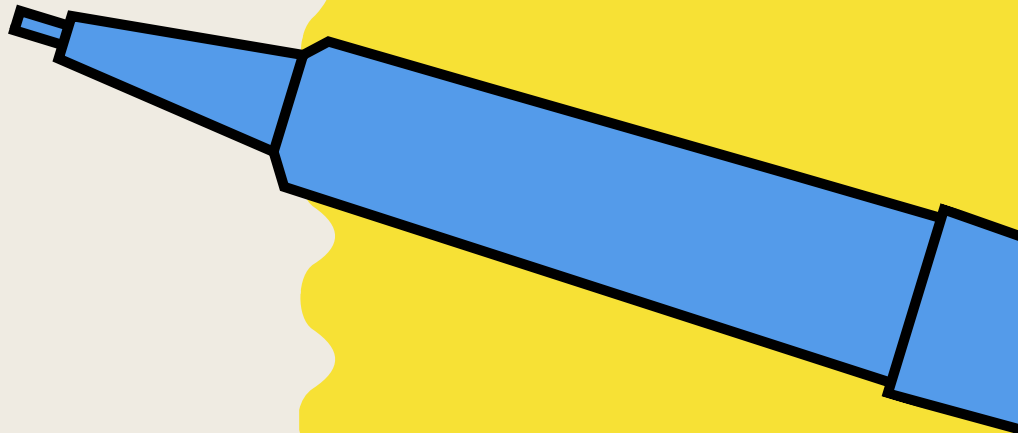

smells, and sounds

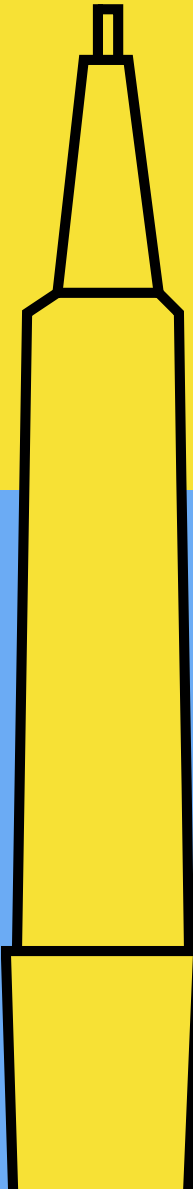
